SHOW REGULATIONS

Wimmera Agricultural Societies Association rules adhered to.

Entries to the show are accepted subject to the rules and regulations and by-laws of the society. The entrant agrees to be bound by those rules and regulations and by-laws. The entrant also agrees to abide by all decisions made by the society, by the group with which it is affiliated or by Victorian Agricultural Shows Ltd pursuant to those rules and regulations and by-laws, and no decision so made shall be called into question by the entrant before the court or other body (whether or not of a similar nature to a court) whatsoever.

- 1. All exhibits must be bona-fide property of the exhibitor.
- No exhibitor is allowed in the section of the yard in which the exhibits are placed during adjudication – Classes E and F excepted; and it shall be the duty of stewards to prevent any person interfering with the judges, and if necessary, to order the removal of such offenders from the yards unless information is required.
- 3. Entries will be received by the secretary until Friday, 6 October at 12 noon.

IMPORTANT

No entries whatsoever will be taken after 12 noon on Friday, October 6 as all books will be handed to the stewards at 1pm.

- 4. FAMILY MEMBERS' TICKETS to be \$30. Single Memberships \$20. Family membership will qualify for free entrance to the ground for members, their partner and all school children under 17.
- 5. Admission fees: Family \$30, Single Adult \$20. All school children under 17, \$5. Under school age, free.
- 6. No person shall be permitted to place an entry in any section and no prize money or trophies will be given out unless subscription for the year has been paid previous

This clause will be strictly adhered to.

- 7. Non-members tickets admitting to the ground may be obtained at the gate on the day of the show.
- 8. The judges may award a second or third prize or withhold a prize where there is no competition or when the exhibit is deemed not to be of sufficient merit.
- No prizes will be awarded by the judges for any exhibit in the supplementary list if the prize list contains a class and section in which the same can compete.
- 10. The committee may withhold all prize money won by persons who shall have been proved to have made erroneous and false statements with regard to their exhibits in making their entry, or entering in violation of the condition of entry and shall be debarred from again exhibiting and if a member, shall be expelled from the society.
- 11. Should any exhibit having gained first prize be disqualified the next in the list does not necessarily obtain the same prize, the committee (with or without the advice of the judges) reserving themselves the right to decide such questions.
- 12. The committee shall also have the power to require a statutory declaration being made concerning any animal or articles which they have reason to suppose is being exhibited contrary to any of the society's rules.

- 13. All persons exhibiting shall accept the decision of the judges appointed by the society, and of the committee in cases of protest or disputes as to the construction of these regulations, or the interpretation of the prize list generally.
- 14. Exhibits to be in the steward's hands by 9.30am, unless noted otherwise in the schedule, on the day of the show, where judging commences at 10.15am.
- 15. Pavilion exhibitors see special note prior to Class N.
- 16. Show patrons are advised that dogs left unattended must be tied up to vehicles and floats. It is also advised that showmen must control their dogs, otherwise action will be taken to remove the dogs from the showground.
- 17. NOTE: Aggregates will be given only if there are two or more exhibitors in the class.
- 18. The committee reserves the right to alter any sections or events contained in this schedule if deemed necessary.

- 1. Exhibitors having won in classes of Fine, Medium and Strong Wool Sections at Show Level will be eligible for the Group Final. The same fleece must be used in all three levels (Show, Group & State) of the competition.
- 2. Class winners & runners up of each class at the Group Final will be eligible for the State Final.
- 3. Each Show/Group is responsible to arrange with the exhibitor methods of delivery and collection of fleeces at Group & State Final. If assistance is required with this, please contact the VAS Ltd office.
- 4. All fleeces to be returned to the owner at the completion of the State Final.
- 5. All fleeces will be judged as per the current recommendations set out by the National Council of Wool Selling Brokers of Australia.
- 6. An exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Group in the State Final in each class.
- 7. Each Fleece entered must be a bona fide product of the exhibitor.
- 8. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final level, then the second-place getter is eligible to compete.
- 9. Entrant details of each winning class from Show Level must be submitted to the respective Group Secretary. Group Secretaries will provide each class winner and runner up details to the VAS Office, which will contact each winner and runner up regarding the State Final.
- 10. An appointed judge for the State Final will be selected by Australian Wool Network and VAS Ltd Livestock & Agricultural Competitions committee.

Ingredients: 125g (4oz) chopped mixed peel; 90g (3oz) chopped red glace cherries; 250g (8oz) sultanas; 250g (8oz) chopped seeded raisins; 250g (8oz90g (3oz) chopped, blanched) currants; 125g almonds, 1/3 c (80mL) sherry or brandy, 250g (8oz) plain flour, 60g(2oz) self-raising flour, $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp grated nutmeg, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp ground ginger, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp ground cloves, 250g (8oz) butter, 250g (8oz) soft brown sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp lemon essence or finely grated lemon rind, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp almond essence, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp vanilla essence, $\frac{1}{2}$ large eggs.

Method:

- 1. Cut the fruit & almonds into 3-4 pieces and mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with sherry or brandy
- 2. Cover and leave for at least one hour; preferably overnight.
- 3. Sift together the flours and spices.
- 4. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences.
- 5. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures.
- 6. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.
- 7. Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately $3\frac{1}{2}$ 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin. NOTE: To ensure uniformity and depending upon their size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4- pieces and almonds crosswise into 3-4 pieces.
